



## Interventions and interveners

### What is an Intervention?

Public comments submitted to the Yukon Water Board in relation to an application or a proceeding are called interventions.

Interventions help the Board make informed decisions in the water licensing and Class 4 placer land use approvals processes.

Most interventions are posted to [Waterline](#), the Board's online public register.

Interventions help the Board understand the broader context and potential effects of a proposed project and may be reviewed as evidence in proceedings.

### Who can be an intervener?

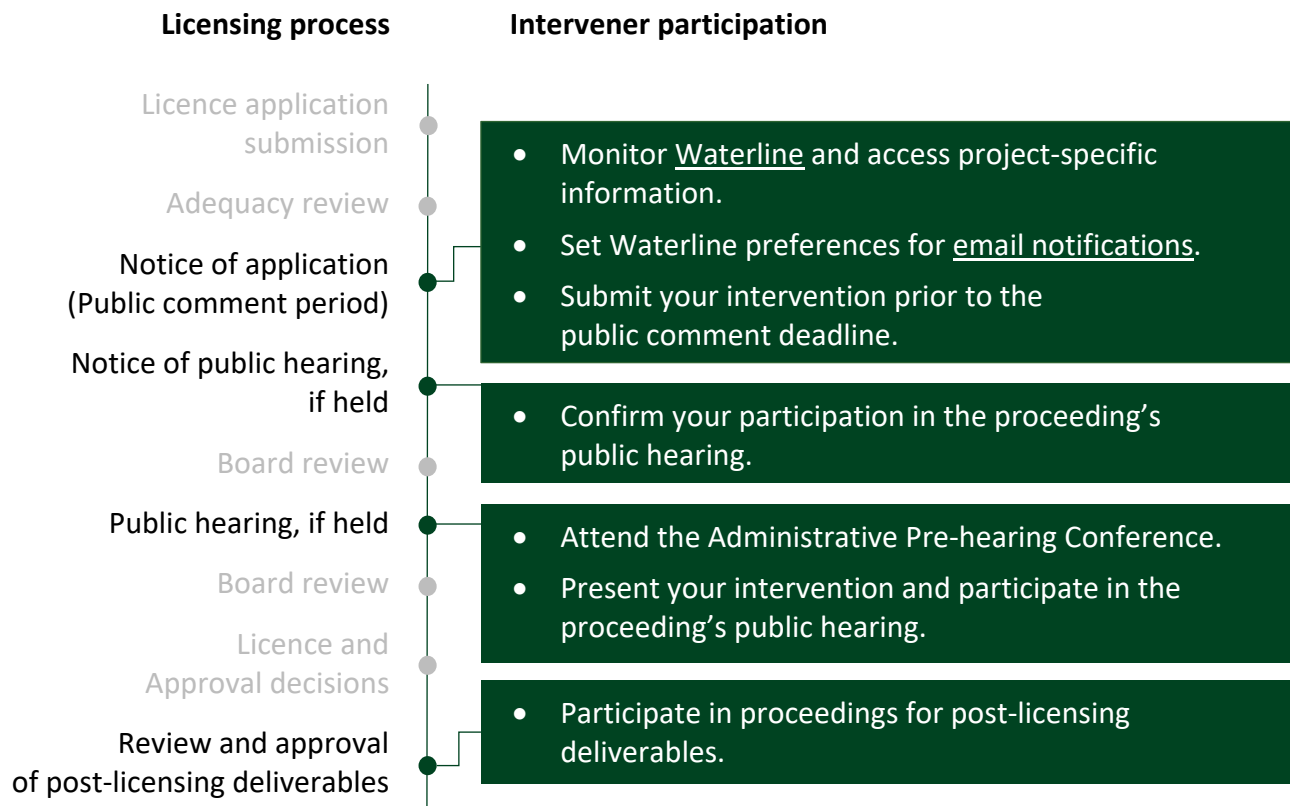
Any person, organization, company, government agency or entity can submit an intervention. A person may submit an intervention as an individual or on behalf of an organization.

You do not need to apply to become an intervener – submission of an intervention during the public comment period is all that is needed. Once you submit an intervention, you will be offered opportunity to participate in the application and proceedings as a party.
